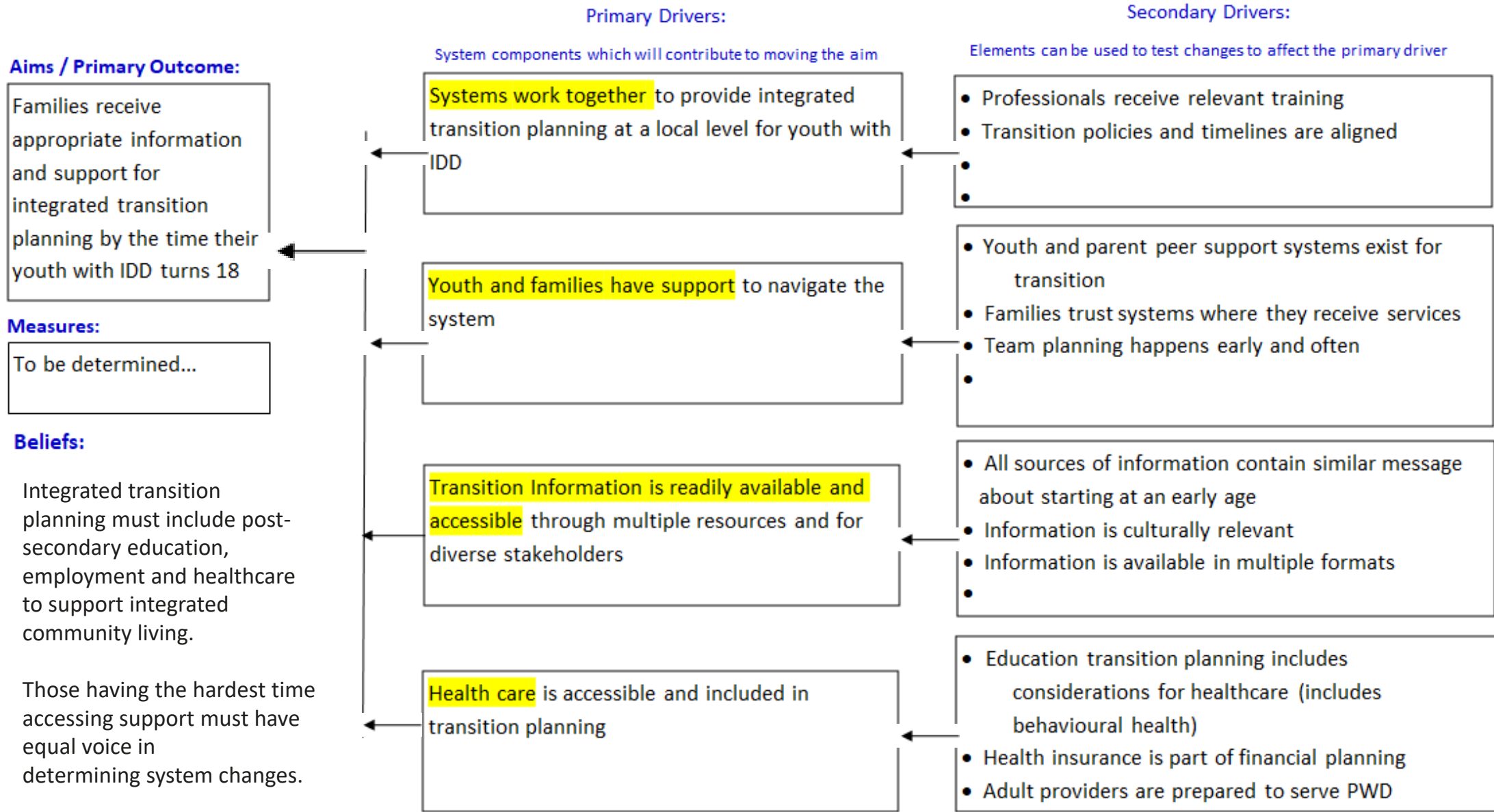
\$125-250,000 per year for 3 years, proposal due 7/13/2021

1. Community-based transition partnership
2. Implementation of the Community-based Pilot
3. Evaluation to assess progress and determine outcomes from the project
4. Resource Development and Knowledge Translation
5. Sustainability

25% of the project's total cost covered with non-federal resources

Focus on youth and adults with ID/DD across racial, ethnic, and cultural groups and in unserved and underserved communities, including limited-English speaking communities, and rural and urban areas

DRAFT DRIVER DIAGRAM



A driver diagram is used to conceptualise an issue and determine its system components which will then create a pathway to get to the goal.
